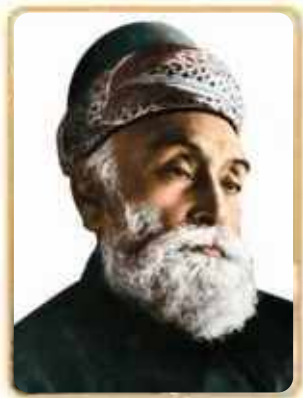
THE GURUKUL

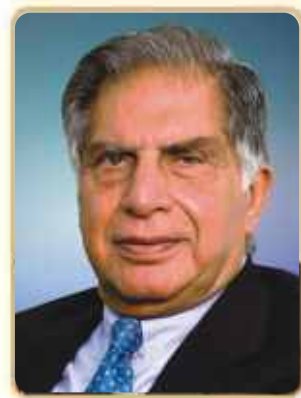

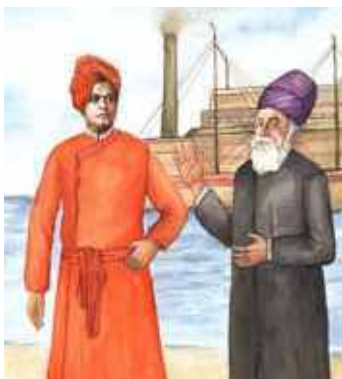

Jamshedji Nusserwanji Tata (3 March 1839 – 19 May 1904), known as one of the fathers of Indian industry.

J. R. D. Tata (29 July 1904 – 29 November 1993), son of Ratanji Tata by his wife Suzanne. As 4th Chairman of Tata Group, he pioneered Indian aviation and founded Tata Airlines (later known as Air India)

Ratan Tata, 5th Chairman of the Tata Group, son of Naval Tata by his first wife Sooni Commissariat



Pramatha Nath Bose (1855–1934) was a pioneering Indian geologist and paleontologist. ...

He is credited with the discovery of petroleum in Assam and the setting up of the first soap factory in India and was instrumental in the setting up of Jamshedpur by writing to J. N. Tata about the rich iron ore reserves

Heroes of Jharkhand



Birsa Munda (15 November 1875 – 9 June 1900) was an Indian tribal freedom fighter, religious leader, and folk hero who belonged to the Munda tribe. He spearheaded a tribal religious Millenarian movement that arose in the Bengal Presidency (now Jharkhand) in the late 19th century, during the British Raj, thereby making him an important figure in the history of the Indian independence movement. The revolt mainly concentrated in the Munda belt of Khunti, Tamar, Sarwada and Bandgaon. His portrait hangs in the Indian Parliament Museum; he is the only tribal leader to have been so honored.

Sidhu Murmu and Kanhu Murmu were the leader of the Santhal rebellion (1855–1856), the rebellion in present-day Jharkhand and Bengal (Purulia and Bankura) in eastern India against both the British colonial authority and the corrupt zamindari system.

Santals lived in and depended on forests. In 1832, the British demarcated the Damin-i-koh region in present day Jharkhand and invited Santhals to settle in the region. Due to promises of land and economic amenities a large numbers of Santhals came to settle from Cuttack, Dhalbhum, Manbhum, Hazaribagh, Midnapore etc. Soon, mahajans and zamindars as tax-collecting intermediaries deployed by British dominated the economy. Many Santals became victims of corrupt money lending practices. They were lent money at exorbitant rates when they never repay then their lands were forcibly taken, they were forced into bonded labour. This sparked the Santal rebellion.



Lance Naik Albert Ekka, PVC (27 December 1942 – 3 December 1971) was a soldier in the Indian Army.



He was martyred in action in the battle of Hilli, during the Indo-Pakistan War of 1971. He was posthumously awarded the Param Vir Chakra, India's highest award for valour in the face of the enemy.

Albert Ekka was born on 27 December 1942, in village Zari, Ranchi, Bihar. His parents were Julius Ekka and Mariam Ekka. Ekka's family belonged to an Adivasi tribe. Hunting was a common sport among the Adivasis, and Ekka was interested in it from his childhood. With his experience of hunting in jungles, he was able to be a better soldier with his skilful use of ground and movements. As he grew, Ekka developed interest for the

army, and was enrolled in the Bihar Regiment on 27 December 1962.

JAMSHEDPUR AT A GLANCE

Being an industrial city with heavy concentration of Tata companies, the city is still blessed with the nature beauty as well.

PARKS

Jubilee Park: situated at the heart of the city, this scrupulously designed park was gifted by Tata steel to the citizens of Jamshedpur on the completion of its 50th year. The park was inaugurated by Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, the first Prime Minister of India in 1956. The lush green park is spread over an area of 37.75 acres and is dotted with flowerbeds and illuminated fountains.

Every year on 3rd March, the entire park is lit up with lights and resplendent fountains are especially illuminated to commemorate the birth anniversary of Jamsetji Nusserwanji Tata, the founder of Tata Empire.

Sir Dorabji Tata Park: Named in the memory of eldest son of J N Tata, the park has manicured lawns and flowerbeds and brilliantly lit fountains. The park hosts Jamshedpur's annual flower show in December every year.

Tata Steel Zoological Park: Situated beside the Jubilee Park, it is a treat for the entire nature lover. A variety of flora and fauna exists in condition close to their natural habitat at the Zoological Park. One gets the chance to observe the flourishing nature, closely, without a microscope.

Dalma Wildlife Sanctuary: Inaugurated by late Sanjay Gandhi in 1975, the sanctuary is located 10 kms away from the city, to the north of Subarnarekha. It stretches 6 kms from east to west and extends over 195 sq kms in the thick forest of Dalma mountain range, which is 3000 ft high. Accessible by road, Dalma is famous for herds of wild elephants, barking deer's, sloth bears, leopards, porcupines and tigers as main inhabitants. On the mountain top are the guest houses of Tata Steel and forest department.

Amusement Park: It is a gift to the children of the steel city. The park is filled with water games and unlimited fun rides. The rides include, whirling in the wind, dashing cars, rolling till moon, derby riding, caterpillar ride and a 75 meters slide.

LAKES

Dimna Lake: Situated at the foot hills of Dalma, Dimna Lake is an artificial reservoir and the main source for the cities drinking water. Located at a distance of 3 kms, the area is an ideal picnic spot. The boat rides can be enjoyed here, too.

Hudco Lake: Situated near the hillocks and surrounded by the panoramic view of the Telco colony, is a beautiful park. Adding to its charm, the park has an artificial waterfall and a man made lake. The park is an ideal picnic spot

Rivers meet: Popularly known as "Domuhani", it is the scenic confluence of the kharkai and Subarnarekha River. It is located at the northwest tip of the city.

SPORTS

Keenan Stadium: It is one of the notable tourist attractions in Jamshedpur. Built in the memory of John Lawrence Keenan, the huge stadium adds to the charm of the city of Jamshedpur and boasts of several national and international sporting events, especially Cricket.

JRD Tata Sports Complex: This is one of the best sports complexes in India. This magnificent complex has an international size football ground with an eight-lane monosynthetic track. The sports complex can hold 40,000 spectators. Facilities for handball, volleyball, hockey and table tennis and a modern gymnasium are also available at the complex.

Sumant Moolgaokar Stadium: The stadium has hosted many national and state athletics meets; it is a renowned stadium with huge seats capacity of 10,000.

Tata Football Academy: Established in 1987, the academy was conceived to nature budding Indian footballers in a scientific way and raises the overall standards of Indian football. Today it is one of the premier breeding ground of India.

Tata Athletics Academy: This four years old academy was inaugurated by the legendary Milkha Singh. The academy taps potential in sportsmen and optimally hone and nurture their talent. The academy churns out international level athletes.

Tata Steel Adventure Foundation (TSAF): It promotes the sports and adventurous activities for the Tata Steel employees, their families and for the residents of Jamshedpur. TSAF arranges wide variety of adventure sports, such as rock climbing, river rafting, parasailing, etc.

Water Sports: Dimna Lake has facilities for thrilling water sports. There is choice between speed boats, row boats, paddle boats and water scooters. Fitness freaks can get their highs by rowing sleek Canadian Canoes and Kayaks.

Horse Riding School: Horse riding is a royal sports and Jamshedpur is known for its Horse Riding School. This must learn sports is enjoyed by everyone. Tata Steel Officers' Beach Club offers the elegant exercise of horse riding at its riding school in the heart of Jamshedpur.

Gliding and Flying Club: It offers wide scope for extra terrestrial sporting activities like guiding and flying.

The Beldih Golf Course: It serves as the bet for the sports enthusiasts who love spending their leisure time out on this sophisticated sport. The huge landscape serves to be the best golf grounds of the city.

Golmuri Golf Course: Yet another golf course, situated in the beautiful surroundings of the hillocks, Golmuri Golf Course also encourages sports in the city.

ARTISTIC LEISURE

Centre for Excellence: In a city inspired by the vision of our founder and illustrated by landmarks that personify the Tata spirit, the Center for Excellence adds a new dimension to the search for excellence. It is a proud testimony to Tata tradition and way of life. First business archive house of the country, it devotes galleries to the steel company and commitments from the founder's vision to the present day technology of the steel work.

Tribal Culture Center (TCC) : It is established to preserve and rejuvenate the dwindling culture of the tribes. TCC helps in providing a platform to the native people to showcase their talents and cultural programmes. TCC also plays an important role in imparting vocational training and organizes tribal festivals and other programmes.

Tagore Society: The society has nearly five branches across the city. The Rabindra Bhawan of the society imparts training to the students in fine arts, music, dance and crafts.

Nritya Kala Kendra: Affiliated to the Prayag Sangeet Samiti, Allahabad and Bhatkhande Sangeet Vidhyapeeth, Lukhnow, it is an institute for learning vocal and instrumental music.

Jamshedpur School of Art (JSA): JSA trains students in painting, sculpting and offers hobby based and semi professional courses too.

Tata Auditorium: Tata auditorium has been host to prestigious seminars and conferences of international stature. Various artists, academicians, litterateurs of national and international fame have left their impression.

Laser and Musical Fountain Show: Inspired by the musical fountains and laser shows at Sentosa Island, Singapore, it is the first of its kind in India. The show set up gives a sight of beautiful colorful beams of light and musical fountain. The effect of the 96 water jets along with the musical fountains leaves the visitors spellbound.



JHARKHAND STATE



Jharkhand ("Bushland" or "The land of forest") is a state in eastern India. The state shares its border with the states of Bihar to the north, Uttar Pradesh to the northwest, Chhattisgarh to the west, Odisha to the south and West Bengal to the east. It has an area of 79,710 km² (30,778 sq mi). It is the 15th largest state by area, and the 14th largest by population. Hindi is the official language of the state. The city of Ranchi is its capital and Dumka its sub capital. The state is known for its waterfalls, hills and holy places; Baidyanath Dham, Parasnath and Rajrappa are major religious sites.

The region has been inhabited since the Mesolithic Chalcolithic period, as shown by several ancient cave paintings. Even evidence of use of iron started in this region as early as 1400 BCE. The region was under the rule of many sovereign and autonomous ruling dynasties including Maurya, Gupta, Gauda, Pala, Nagvanshi, Khayaravala, Ramgarh Raj, Raksel, Chero and Kharagdiha Zamindari estates.



In the 16th century Mughal influence reached the region, and it finally came under the East India Company in the 18th century. After the Independence of India, the region became part of Bihar state. There was demand for a separate state in the region and the Bihar Reorganisation Act, 2000 passed in Parliament, giving rise to the new state of Jharkhand.



Jharkhand suffers from what is sometimes termed a resource curse: it accounts for more than 40% of the mineral resources of India, but 39.1% of its population is below the poverty line and 19.6% of children under five years of age are malnourished. The state is primarily rural, with only 24% of the population living in cities. Jharkhand is among the leading states in economic growth. In 2017–18, the GSDP growth rate of state was at 10.22%.



There's this unique joy that strings in our hearts when we are near waterfalls. The higher the water falls from, the more the thrill of watching its glory. And what if the waterfalls is surrounded by such lush green forests that do not even let sunrays peep in through them when you feel you have been transported into one of those eras, we often read about in old stories, where earth was still gloriously shrouded in green forests, miles away from industrialization. Well, we do not have access to time machines, but we still have such spots in the world, that retains the beauty of nature in all its glory. Lower Ghaghri Falls of Jharkhand, one of the highest waterfalls in India, is one of them.

The Dassam Falls (also known as Dassam Ghagh) is a waterfall located near Taimara village in Bundu police station of Ranchi district in the Indian state of Jharkhand.

Dassam is a changed form of word Da:song which means in mundari language the act of pouring water. Da: means water and song means pouring or measuring. The water fall resembles like somebody is pouring water so the name was Da:song earlier but afterwards the name was changed to Dassam.

The Dassam Falls is a natural cascade across the Kanchi River, a tributary of the Subarnarekha River. The water falls from a height of 44 metres (144 ft). The sound of water echoes all around the place. Dassam Falls at one of the edges of the Ranchi plateau is one of the many scarp falls in the region.

The Dassam Falls is an example of a nick point caused by rejuvenation. Knick point, also called a nick point or simply nick, represents breaks in slopes in the longitudinal profile of a river caused by rejuvenation. The break in channel gradient allows water to fall vertically giving rise to a waterfall. The water of the Dassam Falls is very clean and clear. It is natural for a tourist to be enticed to enter the water for a bath or swim but tourists are warned not to do so because of the current that is generated. There have been many cases of drowning in Dassam Falls. Nine people died of drowning between 2001 and 2006.



Sita fall is a lesser-visited waterfall in the state of Jharkhand. The fall, named after Goddess Sita from Ramayan, was hardly visited by tourists because of its location. However, now Jharkhand Tourism Development Corporation (JTDC) has made immense effort to make the fall easily accessible by both road and rail. Here we bring you every detail about Sita fall, let's know more about this untouched beauty.

The fall holds the mantle of being the highest among numerous falls in the state. As this fall is situated on the Jharkhand – Chattisgarh border, the water coming from the state of Chattisgarh falls from a height of 468 feet into the state of Jharkhand. This fall is situated 14 kilometers north west of Mahuadand block of the Latehar district. Its distance from the state capital Ranchi is 195 kilometers. The deep intense voice of this gigantic fall can be heard prominently through the silent forest. In order to reach the full vision of fall the tourists have to travel through marked pavements and almost 400 steps. The water of river Burha falls from the steep edges of the hill from two sides giving rise to many smaller and larger streams. Under the magnificent gravity of the Lodh fall or Burha Ghagh as it is called by the regionals; the tourists find their troubles and worries washed away and experience a rejuvenation of their inner peace. The falling water of the river then progresses on its journey mixing with other smaller branches eventually becoming a major tributary of the Koel River.

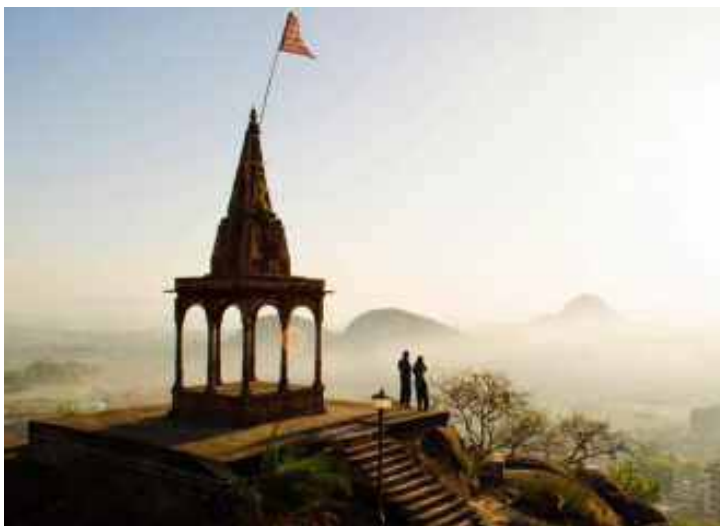
The route to Lodh fall has been reconstructed recently and now provides better mobility for vehicles. The tourists visiting here must come prepared as the nearby area of the fall does not have refreshment facilities. This fall is a great getaway picnic location and the memories of the time spend here in the lap of Mother Nature are hard to forget.





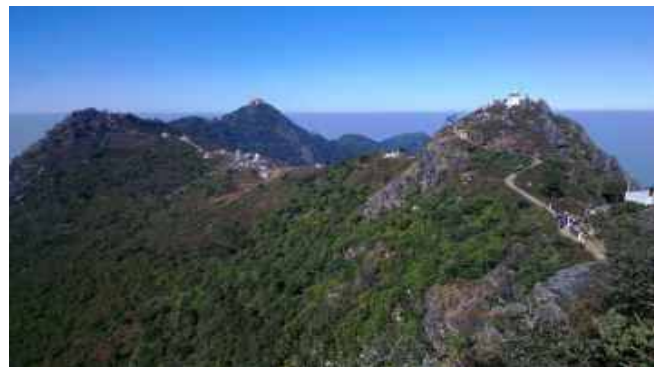
Chandil Dam standing on the Subarnarekha River is a place of scenic beauty. This dam is one of the most visited places of Jharkhand. The museum located close to the Chandil dam has scripts written on rocks, which are 2000 years old. The multi-purpose Chandil dam was built across the meeting place of both the rivers. The dam is 220 meter in height and the height of its water level is 190 meter from different places. Tourists coming from different parts of the country enjoy boating and the natural beauty in and around the dam. Chandil is famous for its importance in the field of tourism. The River Swarnarekha flows through this region. The Karkori River originating from the Hundru falls mingles with the Swarnarekha River here at Chandil.





Parasnath Hill is also recognized as Sri Sammed Sikharji. The Parasnath Hill is situated in Giridih district of Jharkhand. It is a chief Jain pilgrimage site and the holy place for Jains. It is believed in the Jain culture that 20 of the 24 Tirthankaras attained Moksha from this place. The height of the hill is 1,350 meters.

The Tagore Hill is also recognized as the Morabadi Hill. The Tagore hill is located in Morabadi, Ranchi. The brother of Rabindranath Tagore, Jyotirindranath Tagore had made a tour at Ranchi in the year 1908.



Dimna Lake is an artificial lake in Jamshedpur, which is situated at around 13 km from the city. This lake lies at the foot hills of Dalma Mountain ranges. The Dimna Lake is important for the city, as it serves like



a water reservoir for the steel plant and the main drinking water source. This lake is half an hour drive away from the main city and can be visited by a cab or a bus. It is located in the Mirzadih Panchayat of Patamda Block and was constructed by the Tata Steel. Tourists can visit this place in winters between November and February. There are boating and other water sports facilities provided including jet skiing and rowing in this lake.

How to reach Jamshedpur :

Jamshedpur is well connected with eastern part of country by Air, Rail and Road.

- Nearest airport from The Wave International (the conference venue) is Birsa Munda International Airport, Ranchi. It is approximately 100 km from conference venue and well connected by four lane highway.
- Nearest Railway station is Tatanagar (approx 15 km from conference venue). It is located 250 km away from Kolkata on Howrah-Mumbai main line.
- Jamshedpur is also well connected by road with various cities like Kolkata, Ranchi, Patna, Bhubaneswar, Dhanbad, Bokaro etc.
